#### **Eligibility requirements:**

- Self-nominations are welcome
- Researchers who have not received this award within the past three years are eligible
- Article will represent outstanding family research
- Lead author must be faculty member at Purdue University
- Articles must be published work during the 2023 calendar year (may be published in print or in advance online)
- Articles must have been published in a peerreviewed journal
- Articles must be empirical (both qualitative and quantitative methods are welcome, but narrative literature reviews are not eligible)
- Published work may be from any discipline, department, or college

#### HOW TO NOMINATE

Submit nominations to the 2024 Committee Chair, Melissa Franks: mfranks@purdue.edu

Nominations must include:

- Cover letter indicating support for a given article as outstanding family research
- Electronic copy of the nominated article
- Contact information for the nominator and the lead author for the article

#### CENTER FOR FAMILIES FACUTLY FELLOWSHIP (\$10,000)

Each year, CFF awards one faculty fellowship of up to \$10,000 to support a faculty member who is engaged in research focused on family processes or policies, broadly defined.

Topics of interest for 2024 include, but are not limited to: engagement of families with educational, workplace, or community settings; contemporary family forms; childcare issues and policies; contributions of families to individual health and development in challenging contexts.

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# BOB L. AND JOYCE BEERY MILES UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH ENHANCEMENT GRANT (\$500)

This grant is given to faculty to fund student training and involvement in research. Funds can be used for student travel to research or training opportunities, or to provide stipends for undergraduate members of research teams. Faculty members apply on behalf of students.

This grant is available thanks to the Bob L. and Joyce Beery Miles Endowment. After seeing the impact a small amount of support can have on the trajectory of a student, Bob and Joyce created the endowment, further committing their ongoing support of undergraduate research at Purdue.



#### HOW TO APPLY FOR FACULTY OPPORTUNITIES

All materials listed below must be combined into one file in PDF and submitted through the electronic CFF application process.

- 1. Statement of Purpose no longer than 3 double-spaced pages in which you:
  - Identify the goals of your proposed project
  - Explain how this project aligns with the opportunity you are applying for and how it will advance the work of the Center for Families
  - Provide a summary of your relevant experiences and qualifications for carrying out this project
- 2. A Budget Justification or COEUS budget. CFF Fellowship funds should not be allocated to indirect costs
- 3. Curriculum Vitae

Faculty may apply for more than one award, but can receive only one. Preference will be given to CFF faculty partners, faculty who have not previously received CFF funding, amd proposals that will lead to external funding affiliated with the Center for Families.

#### GRADUATE STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Center for Families offers internships and research grants to students that allows them to engage in a program of scholarly activity of their own design, related to the focus of the grant. Student work must be supervised by a faculty member. Students may apply for more than one opportunity. Preference is given to those who have not been selected to receive other CFF funding and students who are advised by CFF faculty partners.

# FAMILY RESEARCH GRANT (\$1,000)

This grant is for students who will generate important new information about families. It allows the student to supplement funding available for research-related expenses or travel.

# DR. SHELLEY MACDERMID WADSWORTH GRADUATE STUDENT RESEARCH RECOGNITION GRANT (\$1,000)

This grant will support students conducting research or thesis work that is directly impacting the community with a strong focus on work and family. It will allow graduate students to attend workshops or professional conferences. Recipients must be involved with the Center for Families, the Military Family Research Institute, or they must have a faculty advisor who is a Center for Families faculty partner.

# STUDORSCHKA INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH GRANT (\$1,000)

The Interdisciplinary Research Grant is for students who have chosen a field of study that combines two or more academic disciplines with the study of the families. The work must be supervised by two faculty members in two different departments.

This grant is possible due to the generosity of Dr. Travis Dorsch and Dr. Breanna Studenka. While completing his doctoral dissertation in Health and Kinesiology at Purdue, Travis spent hours learning about families, as he recognized that you can't study individuals in isolation. He sought out support from the CFF Funding Program, which helped launch his career. He and Bree hope this interdisciplinary grant will help launch the career of others.

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- 1. Statement of Purpose no longer than 3 double-spaced pages in which you:
  - Identify the goals of your proposed project
  - Explain how this project aligns with the opportunity you are applying for and how it will advance the work of the Center for Families
  - Provide a summary of your relevant experiences and qualifications for carrying out this project
- 2. Budget Justification (Describe how you will use the CFF funding to support your project goals)
- 3. Curriculum Vitae
- 4. Letter of support from the faculty member(s) who has agreed to supervise the project work (Interdisciplinary Research Grant applicants must provide at least two letters of support from faculty in two different departments)

Students may apply for more than one opportunity. Preference is given to those who have not been selected to receive other CFF funding, and students who are advised by CFF faculty partners.

The Center for Families offers internships, awards, and grants to students based on the quality of the student's academic accomplishments and the fit of their work with the Center for Families' mission and ongoing work.
