THE LORENE BURKHART AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH ABOUT FAMILIES

The Burkhart Award recognizes outstanding family research being conducted by Purdue Faculty. Nominations are required for award consideration. All nominated articles will be evaluated by a panel of reviewers from the Center for Families Review Committee. The award recipient will receive \$500.

Eligibility requirements:

- Self-nominations are welcome
- Researchers who have not received this award within the past three years are eligible
- Article will represent outstanding family research
- Lead author must be faculty member at Purdue University
- Articles must be published work during the 2024 calendar year (may be published in print or in advance online)
- Articles must have been published in a peerreviewed journal
- Articles must be empirical (both qualitative and quantitative methods are welcome, but narrative literature reviews are not eligible)
- Published work may be from any discipline, department, or college

HOW TO NOMINATE

Submit nominations to the 2025 Committee Chair, Melissa Franks: mfranks@purdue.edu

Nominations must include:

- Cover letter indicating support for a given article as outstanding family research
- Electronic copy of the nominated article
- Contact information for the nominator and the lead author for the article

FACULTY OPPORTUNITIES

CENTER FOR FAMILIES FACUTLY FELLOWSHIP (\$10,000)

Each year, the Center for Families awards one faculty fellowship of up to \$10,000 to support a faculty member who is engaged in research focused on family processes or policies, broadly defined.

As a way to celebrate the Center for Families 30th Anniversary and its keystone initiative, this year's theme will focus on Family Meals, Nutrition, and Health. Faculty who choose to submit applications which incorporate this theme into their submission will receive preference in review.

HOW TO APPLY FOR FACULTY OPPORTUNITIES

All materials listed below must be combined into one file in PDF and submitted through the electronic CFF application process.

- 1. Statement of Purpose no longer than 3 double-spaced pages in which you:
 - Identify the goals of your proposed project
- Explain how this project aligns with the opportunity you are applying for and how it will advance the work of the Center for Families
- Provide a summary of your relevant experiences and qualifications for carrying out this project
- 2. A Budget Justification or COEUS budget. CFF Fellowship funds should not be allocated to indirect costs
- 3. Curriculum Vitae

Faculty may apply for more than one award, but can receive only one. Preference will be given to CFF faculty partners, faculty who have not previously received CFF funding, amd proposals that will lead to external funding affiliated with the Center for Families.

GRADUATE STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Center for Families offers internships and research grants to students that allows them to engage in a program of scholarly activity of their own design, related to the focus of the grant. Student work must be supervised by a faculty member. Students may apply for more than one opportunity. Preference is given to those who have not been selected to receive other CFF funding and students who are advised by CFF faculty partners.


CATHERINE L. JUSTICE FAMILY NUTRITION GRANT (\$1,000)

This grant is for students pursuing research on the quality of life for children and families, focusing on nutrition, and specifically diet or public policy.

Justice Trust. Catherine L. Justice, former Associate

Professor in the Department of Food and Nutrition
and Founder of the National Center for Nutrition
and Dietetics, touched the lives of many dietitians in
Indiana and throughout the U.S. as well.



INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH GRANT (\$1,000)

The Interdisciplinary Research Grant is for students who have chosen a field of study that combines two or more academic disciplines with the study of the families. The work must be supervised by two faculty members in two different departments.

This grant is possible due to the generosity of Dr.
Travis Dorsch and Dr. Breanna Studenka. While
completing his doctoral dissertation in Health and
Kinesiology at Purdue, Travis spent hours learning
about families, as he recognized that you can't study
individuals in isolation. He sought out support from
the CFF Funding Program, which helped launch his
career. He and Bree hope this interdisciplinary grant
will help launch the career of others.

DR. SHELLEY MACDERMID WADSWORTH GRADUATE STUDENT RESEARCH RECOGNITION GRANT (\$1,000)

This grant will support students conducting research or thesis work that is directly impacting the community with a strong focus on work and family. It will allow graduate students to attend workshops or professional conferences. Recipients must be involved with the Center for Families, the Military Family Research Institute, or they must have a faculty advisor who is a Center for Families faculty partner.

This grant is available thanks to the Dr. Shelley
MacDermid Wadsworth Graduate Student
Research Recognition Fund, created in her honor as
recognition of her leadership as the director of the
Center for Families.

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GRADUATE STUDENT OPPORTUNITIES

EDWARD V. AND MARY E. MCALLISTER FELLOWSHIP

The McAllister Fellow will collaborate with their advisor on research related to the quality of life for children and families. The fellowship provides 12 months of stipend equaling that offered to half-time research assistants, plus funds to cover some additional fees.

The McAllister carries no duties other than completion of the work described in student's application. Applicants must have a master's degree, have completed their PhD qualifying exam, and be a U.S. citizen.



2013 McAllister Fellowship was awarded to Jill Trumbell, Human Development and Family Science, *Attachment Behavior and Representation across Early Childhood: Links to Maternal Behavior.* Trumbell is now Assistant Professor at the University of New Hampshire.

- 1. Statement of Purpose no longer than 3 double-spaced pages in which you:
 - Identify the goals of your proposed project
 - Explain how this project aligns with the opportunity you are applying for and how it will advance the work of the Center for Families
 - Provide a summary of your relevant experiences and qualifications for carrying out this project
- 2. Budget Justification (Describe how you will use the CFF funding to support your project goals)
- 3. Curriculum Vitae
- 4. Letter of support from the faculty member(s) who has agreed to supervise the project work (Studorshcka Interdisciplinary Research Grant applicants must provide at least two letters of support from faculty in two different departments)

Students may apply for more than one opportunity. Preference is given to those who have not been selected to receive other CFF funding, and students who are advised by CFF faculty partners.
